A [2025 C.S. Mott Children's Hospital poll](#) found that over a third of parents reported their child experienced oral hygiene-related dental issues, such as cavities, discolored teeth and tooth pain. These problems were more common in children who practiced fewer than two oral care habits daily, a finding that underscores the importance of adult oversight in ensuring consistent day-to-day routines.

"Beyond the immediate dental discomfort, untreated tooth decay creates chronic pain and infection that can compromise a child's entire systemic health and development," said Dr. Deffke. "This not only impacts school concentration and academic performance, but also affects self-esteem, social confidence and overall healthy growth."
